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## Why is reading (aloud) important?

- Reading can help both adults and children connect with others. It allows you to **explore different social contexts** and **understand diverse cultures**.
- Being a reader enhances your **imagination** and encourages **creative thinking**.
- Reading provides exposure to different environments and therefore introduces **new** and expands one's **vocabulary**.
- The more you read, the more words you will know which improves your **grammar**. This builds **oral language** skills and can improve **writing skills**.
- Reading can make you more **empathetic** as it helps you to wonder about and/or relate to a variety of **emotions and feelings** portrayed by several unique characters in books.

*Remember, reading is fun!*

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- Take time to visit your local library with your child.
  - Encourage your child to choose the book that they would like to read and let them retell the story in their own words and create voices for the different characters.
  - Talk about the pictures in the book and ask questions about the story and characters.

You don't always have to read to build a world of adventures with your child. Storytelling is just as much a learning opportunity and inspires the joy of reading.
